And the family had enthusiastically taken up the idea of a secret Santa for their employeesthough I secretly wondered if they really knew what a secret Santa was.

Then, of course, they threw the Christmas party, and bought some booze (though their religion forbade drinking) and they topped the drinks of all their guests like good hosts, and then stood around grinning and looking very merry because their guests were very merry. The matriarch of the clan had also come to the party, and she looked a little wistful, because she had lost her husband only a few years after they had come to America, and now she was sick herself. She may have been a little wistful, too, because the son who had founded the company, a brilliant young man, had thrown off the turban prescribed by his religion and cut off his beard ("Man, people looked at me like I was crazy"), and now rarely attended temple.

"It's very nice," she shrugged and smiled at everyone and everything, though she wouldn't drink the champagne that was raised in a toast. "Against my religion," she whispered to me, though she did raise her glass with everyone else. The employees of the firm, aside from the family, were all American kids and seemed to be having a good time—they got into every picture with the family and smiled broadly. But the biggest smiles of all were reserved for the family itself, because it had realized a measure of the American dream and was now a real American family, too.

I don't remember Christmas in Greece; I suppose we celebrated it. I do remember it in America becoming a dream come true for every kid, and perhaps, a part of the American dream for every immigrant, as well.



Brademas Honored By Common Cause

Exceptts of remarks by Dr. John Brademas, president emeritus New York University, on receiving the John W. Gardner Spirit Award from Common Cause at the Harvard Club in New York City

t is for several reasons that I count it a particular honor to receive the John Gardner Spirit Award from Common Cause/New York.

In the first place, I admire the dedication of Common Cause to its "struggle for honest and accountable government" over the last generation, and I voice my thanks to Rachel Leon for her work in organizing this reception. Second, I feel privileged to be receiving the award on the same occasion that Gregory Long, leader of The New York Botanical Garden, and Kent Yalowitz, a distinguished lawyer, are also honored. And I am well aware that earlier recipients of The John Gardner Spirit Award were Andrew Heiskell and President William Clinton.

Moreover, as you are saluting Derek Bok as the outgoing chairman of the National Governing Board of Common Cause, I observe that not only am I a Harvard graduate but I was a member of the Harvard Board of Overseers when many years ago we confirmed Derek Bok as president of Harvard and I wish him well as he returns to this responsibility.

I'm also glad to see so many friends and colleagues, including, of course, my wife, Mary Ellen, the beautiful and brilliant physician, and members of my dedicated staff. I want especially to acknowledge one of my distinguished successors as President of New York University, John Sexton; and his able Senior Vice President, who served with me in Washington, Lynne Brown.

We meet, of course, only days after the Congressional elections, the results of which afford important offerings for Common Cause and those who champion reform in the way government at every level performs. Charlie Rangel, as Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, will, I know, do his part!

Here I note that I served as a Member of the disabled.

Congress for 22 years, with, accordingly, six Presidents—three Republicans: Eisenhower, Nixon and Ford; and three Democrats: Kennedy, Johnson and Carter.

Most of you will, I hope, agree that the results of the elections on November 7 give Congress and the American people an

opportunity greatly improve the operation of our national government.

In this respect, I note that CED, the Committee for Economic Development, the organization, as you

know, composed of some 200 corporate executives and a few university presidents, of whom I am one, has embarked on a project called "Making Washington Work." These business and university leaders are deeply concerned about the breakdown of the policy-making and political process in a Republican! Washington. Accordingly, we are drafting a report with several recommendations we hope will be taken seriously in the new Congress, with respect to transparency, accountability and effective enforcement of the rules of legislative procedure, all values associated with the mission of Common

Now I served eleven terms, for twenty-two years, in the House of Representatives, my last four years as House Majority Whip, I was defeated in Ronald Reagan's 1980 landslide victory over President Carter and shortly thereafter invited to become President of then House Committee on Education and Labor, I took part in writing all the measures and the humanities; libraries and museums; and measures to assist children, the elderly,

These observations bring me, of course, to the final reason I count receiving an award in the name of John W. Gardner particularly

John Gardner was a most remarkable person, I need not tell all of you. Without my here rehearsing his biography, let me recall that as he was Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare and I was on the House Committee with responsibility for education legislation, we had the opportunity on more than one occasion to work together.

In preparing for this evening's event, I recalled how John Gardner, now as founder of the Urban Coalition, came to South Bend, Indiana in 1968 to kick-off my campaign for reelection that year. Fortunately, I have been able to find clippings from the South Bend Tribune about his speech.

One of the statements John Gardner made in endorsing my reelection to a sixth term was the following; "John is a Democrat, and I'm a Republican. But we stand together on every significant issue affecting the life and the future of this nation."

Emulating Mr. Gardner's commitment to bipartisanship, I must confess that I married

I came to regard John Gardner, the founder of Common Cause, as a mentor, and when I lost my bid for reelection to a twelfth term, he counseled me to be sure to engage in significant pro bono activities and, beyond my responsibilities at New York University, I have sought to do so.

As I close, I shall recall what I said nearly 40 years ago in introducing John Gardner to my Indiana constituents on June 12, 1968.

I said of Mr. Gardner then, "I know of few figures in American life whose words and thoughts on the great questions before us command such widespread respect, from New York University. Having served on the both Democrats and Republicans, liberals and conservatives."

So for all the reasons I have suggested enacted during those years in support of and I could add still more but I'm a child of schools, colleges and universities; the arts the House of Representatives and not the Senate!—I voice my deep appreciation to Common Cause/New York for the great honor you have done me.




life and in his public service.







N:Even as a summer destination, Greece has a lot more to offer, besides the stereotyped, albeit breathtaking, Aegean Sea islands. Is your ministry going to promote the more off-the-beaten-path islands and areas, as in the Ionian Sea, for example; Gavdos, the southern part of Crete in general; or the countryside with its unique, ever unfolding character? What about an

Easter in a Greek village package?

FP: All these you mentioned have already become main goals in our policy. Firstly, I would like to underline the fact that for the first time our promotion campaign includes destinations and areas and focuses for related activities. This is what we have in mind when we talk about the unique experience Greece has to offer. I know that more and more tour operators and travel agents include such destinations and tours in their packages. After all, this is the authentic, traditional face of Greece, bonded to its people, the plain and beautiful way of life.



N: After your tenure as minister of Tourist Development, what would you like your most important accomplishments to have been, something that you'd wish to be

FP: The fact is that never before there were so many things being done for tourism, at the same time and at this extent, as nowadays. But I believe that one person, one politician alone, cannot achieve the goals pursued if there is no teamwork; a collective effort by people who share the same vision and inspiration. For me, personally, when things get done, when problems are solved, when the future looks promising, then you can talk about success. "Offering" is the keyword, and when people refer to you or remember you for what you really have offered, this can be the best reward.

BASILE Growing up Greek—and funny—in America

ou think you had it rough? We had it very rough. All of our friends down the street had lemonade stands and Kool Aid stands-I was seven years old and had a diner. We did a late breakfast and early lunch—but I had to close early because I had a curfew-and second grade was a bitch.

"Everyone thinks my grandmother always beat the hell out of me and she was probably the kindest person in the world," says softspoken Basile Katsikis, 45, known worldwide as the blustery Basile in his wildly-popular comedy act Growing Up Greek in America (on DVD and CD as Growing up Greek in America, Comedy Greek Style; Growing up Greek in America II, Live from Boston; Growing up Greek in America III, Greeks Gone Wild--he's even posed with a foustanela and namesake Billy goat.) "I create these various characters of my mother, my father, my grandmother and people identify with them and it doesn't seem slapsticky because it's something we've all gone through and we can all identify with."

How many times was I left in the back of the car in the middle of July with the windows shut while my grandmother and mother were out on the side of the highway picking horta? How many times my mother almost beat the hell out of me because I threw away the Wonder Bread bag, because this was the 70's and no plastic bags were available and my mother and viavia used the bags for their horta. My mother saw me throw away a Wonder Bread bag once and that was the end of me.

He tours year-round (he's been doing standup for close to 20 years and has been on Leno), sells out Montreal's international "Just For Laughs" comedy special every year, sells out in London where Greeks cross from Scotland to hear him (and the Greeks in his act suddenly speak with brogues) and last year did a month in Australia, where he



packed Sydney's Darling Harbor with 17,000 screaming fans. "I never felt like a rock star before," he says. "These people were just clamoring to get closer to the stage and the laughter that came was like a tidal wave. Whoosh! I got very excited, man, I think my nipples were hard for about a

His Greeks Gone Wild DVD was filmed in Montreal and like most of his standup performances around the world, picked up on the flavor of the Greeks in that country. "It's so cool because they speak French and Greek-mazi," says Basile. "I call it Freak. They can tell you to go to hell in French and it sounds so good!" He now sees people watching his DVDs everywhere he goes, including Greece, where he says he's known as the hazo Amerikanaki. "It's so cool to see people all over the world getting into it," he says. "The DVDs are all over--in Australia, the UK, Germany, South Africa, I mean everyone has them. It's the neatest things in the world."

There is no such thing as a Greek terrorist. If there was, the worse thing he could do is maybe close down a diner for an hour.

I went on Olympic Airlines. Oh, my God. I think I know their new motto: You Never Have to Wait in Line--because there is no line! You run to the counter, you kick and slap, you give them a nah, you give them another nah, you pull their hair, they pull yours, and that's how you get serviced first.

Making a career out of comedy was a gamble for a kid from Long Island who thought he was going to be a lawyer. "Can you see me as an attorney?" he says. "If you're confusing legal torts with French pastry, you've got to get out of the business." While working as an administrator at a Cleveland law firm he began to moonlight doing open mikes and knew he loved it—though he used only his first name to disguise himself. "Until a

bunch of girls that I worked with all came to a male review show and I was the MC, and that was the end of that," he says. He soon quit his job and hit the road.

Oh, my God, I love my faith. Because everything we celebrate, we celebrate late. We're the only people who can make Jesus come back twice in the same year. We celebrate Easter five weeks after everybody else, which is great, because our candy is so much cheaper. Course they're broken by then. It took me twenty years to realize that chocolate bunnies do have ears.

He's now taking his act to television (he's developing a sitcom called Basile, which takes place in a restaurant, of course). "I think the sitcom is a unique show," he says. "We put together a combination that Greeks and non-Greeks can identify with. I'm very, very proud of our heritage. I always want to pay respect to that." The show is being developed with Harry Pappas of Pappas Telecasting Companies. "He has been extremely instrumental in helping us develop the show a little bit further than we had before," says Basile. "The man has tremendous insight, and I really look forward to working with

He's also marketing his own line of Basile's Greek Style Seasonings and Marinades with the Rose Hill Food Company. "My name is George Sarbanes and I love your show," he was told one day by a fan. "I own a food company and I would really like you to try my spices." He did, they were "wonderful, but they needed a little of Basilizing," he says. "Because I want you and your wife and your pethera, they're the ones who will do all the business when it comes to food, to try these out. So we did a little bit here, a little bit there, and about three months later I say, 'George, I think we did it here.' He goes, 'Good. I want you to put your name on it." Most recently, the spices were picked up by food retail giant Costco in America.

close down a diner for an hour.

Basile is an all-around entertainer (he's voiced Bullwinkle in the cartoon and after the producers of Broadway's Hairspray caught him belting tunes in his non-Greek Atlantic City act they asked him to audition for the role of the well-padded, leatherlunged matriarch Edna), but he admits standup is his first love. "That is the one great joy-if you've never been onstage as a standup, it's a wonderful feeling. It's almost like when you're acting, or whatever, you have that tremendous feeling of going out there and killing an audience. Not just claps, Oh, that was witty. It's when you have an audience you can just kill for and they love

Which is not the same as going home

One time I flew home from Vegas. The first time I was ever at Vegas, and I'm saying, this is pretty cool. Next thing you know, I'm back home and my wife meets me at the gate--and she never meets me at the gate. I'm wearing leather pants, a gold lame shirt, my leather bomber jacket that has fox fur around the collar, and I walk off the plane and think, God, bless her, my agent must have called her and told her what a wonderful job I did in Vegas. And she runs up to me, kisses me on the cheek, and goes, 'Listen, great, we gotta go! The dishwasher isn't here today and you gotta wash dishes.' And my heart, which was just jumping with joy, just dropped. Here I was in leather pants, a gold lame shirt, with all my jewelry on, and I'm over at my in-laws café with my sleeves rolled up, my jewelry on the top of the counter, and I'm serving mashed potatoes with gravy and meatloaf to the customers. And this guy looks at me. 'I just saw you on Showtime,' he says. 'That's my hobby,' I say, "this is my real job.'





Athens-Sparta Artifacts At The Onassis Cultural Center

thens-Sparta, an exhibition of rare archaeological artifacts and works of art from Athens and Sparta, Greece, was inaugurated earlier this month by Greek Minister of Culture George Voulgarakis at the Onassis Cultural Center in New York City. Archbishop of America Demetrios, Anna Diamandopoulos, member of the Hellenic Parliament and former EU commissioner, Anthony Papademetriou, Onassis Foundation president, and Ambassador Loukas Tsilas, director of the Onassis Cultural Center in New York, highlighted the dignitaries at the inauguration and a special reception that followed. Dr. Nikos Kaltsas, Director of the National Archaeological Museum of Greece and the exhibition's curator, guided the guests through the exhibit of artifacts.

Athens-Sparta balances our contemporary perspective on the uneven cultural relationship between the two ancient city-states--in which Attic art was traditionally recognized as the more culturally advanced of the two. By bringing together such a vast selection of important artifacts from each city-state, the exhibition challenges these perceptions, bringing to light the refinements of Laconic art and culture.

Highlights include treasures such as a marble statue of a hoplite, known as "Leonidas", from the end of the 5th century B.C.; a marble statue of an Athenian Kore from the Acropolis Museum, from the 5th Century B.C.; bronze figurines of hoplites from Sparta, from the 8th to the 6th Centuries B.C.; a ceramic kylix by the Arkesilas Painter from the 6th Century B.C.; a marble statuette of Athena from the mid-4th Century B.C.; Attic marble reliefs and grave stele from the late 5th Century B.C.; and arrowheads and spearheads from Thermopylae, the famous 5th century battlefield.

The 289 exquisite artifacts in the exhibition, many of which are traveling abroad for the first time, will be on view at the

Onassis Cultural Center in New York through May 12,

This exhibition includes loans from the Acropolis Museum, Epigraphical Museum, Kerameikos Archaeological Museum, National Archaeological Museum, the Numismatic Museum, 3rd Ephorate of Prehistoric and Classical Antiquities, the Archaeological Museum in Marathon, the Archaeological Museum in Olympia, the Archaeological Museum in Rhodes, and the Archaeological Museum in Sparta, all located in Greece. Athens-Sparta will also include pieces from the Vatican Museums, Vatican City; the Boston Museum of Fine Arts; and the American Numismatic Society in New York.

In conjunction with the exhibition, the Onassis Cultural Center will organize an international scholarly conference, a lecture program in New York, as well as dramatic readings of Thucydides' History of the Peloponnesian War and Aeschylus' The Persians in various






The "Greek" invasion the real estate agent was afraid of is clearly reflected in the Gold Coast Chapter's 25 years history as well. "We started with about 30 members and how

A process that, interestingly enough, goes against a national shrinking that characterizes the majority of the AHEPA chapters throughout the country. According to the chapter president John Levas, the success in attracting new people is also due to the welcoming climate that prevails among the membership: "It's a very nice chapter, it's a good gathering place to come together once a month...We have meetings, the last Wednesday of every month in Port Washington. Our meetings are very interest-

but we also have our own bartender and everybody has a really good time," he joked. A sentiment echoed by Nick Katopodis,



group of people has been like a second, an extended family!"


"Our chapter is very different for another important reason," Neamonitis adds. "We don't get involved in political issues. That's what really keeps our chapter together. The youth will follow. EXPLORING THE FUTURE OF AMERICAN HELLENISM

he Future of Hellenism in America," was thoroughly explored during the AHIF's (American Hellenic Institute Foundation) successful 5th Annual Conference on the subject, held recently at The Westin St. Francis Hotel in San Francisco, California. This impressive symposium, organized in cooperation with the Alexander S. Onassis Public Benefit Foundation, featured prominent speakers from the fields of education, law and the private sector, who identified key challenges facing the Greek American community today.

Conference Chairman George Marcus Chairman of Marcus & Millichap - opened the day-long symposium by stating among else: "... it is very probable that we could be one generation away from disappearing as an ethnic group in the United States. And there are two thoughts about that. There is one that says we are a melting pot and we will sort of melt away. The other one is that America is a stew of people who can stick together for the benefit of America and for the benefit of Greek Americans, for the benefit of our relationships with one another, and the benefit of Greece. We have something you can't buy, you can't join - we were born into a special club. Our heritage is something that was granted to us by God and our parents ... And the real question is, can we create institutions today that will maintain a reason for our children and their children to maintain roots within our society?"

Professor Dan Georgakas, Director of the Greek American Studies Project at the Center for Byzantine and Modern Greek Studies at Queens College-CUNY, was the keynote speaker. "I think we have to revive the language. We really have to understand modern Greek culture, modern Greek history as well," he pointed out. "We have to be connected to that, we have to understand our own culture and then we have to embrace these new technologies and move forward. And I think if we do that, that maybe 50 years from now people will gather in a room like this and they will say, gee we've got some problems today,





If we don't we will be considered a weak, ineffectual, ethnic community of little consequence and the result will be a weakened Hellenism in America."

The conference organizer Nick Larigakis stated, "We are extremely pleased with this conference. It is one of the finest we have had in the five years that we been hosting this themed conference. San Francisco proved to be a very good choice this year. The participation was very good and the audience came well prepared and very eager to engage the speakers in constructive dialogue. We look forward to continuing to take this conference to cities around the U.S. I want to also thank all our sponsors and benefactors who made this possible, and especially Mr. and Mrs. George Marcus and the Alexander S. Onassis Following lunch, the moderator for the Public Benefit Foundation. Without their support, this would not have been possible."

The weekend conference began with a Friday night dinner for the speakers and other invited guests hosted by George and Judy Marcus and Dr. Kenny and Angie Frangadakis at the critically acclaimed Kokkari Restaurant in San Francisco.





Homeric Award Given To **Ambassador** Vassilakis

mbassador Adamantios Vassilakis, Greece's Permanent Representative at the UN, who is about to retire after almost four decades in service, was this year's (29th) recipient of the prestigious Homeric Award granted to him during a lavish gala at the Chian Cultural Center in Astoria, New York. The award, established by The Chian Federation in 1977, is presented to individuals who have demonstrated an advocacy for human rights, the rule of law and democratic ideals, and have worked to strengthen relations between the United States and Greece.

George Almyroudis, the federation's president, upon conferring on Ambassador Vassilakis the Homeric Award, praised his service as a diplomat and expressed his gratitude and pride on behalf of the rest of the Chian people as well, that one of their own had excelled while performing his duty to Greece.

Diplomats from Greece, Cyprus, Austria and other countries were also present and were especially generous in their accolades towards Ambassador Vassilakis, as were Greek American leaders from various key organizations, among them NYU President John Brademas.

The late Archbishop Iakovos, the late Constantinos Karamanlis, president of the Hellenic Republic, Senators D'Amato, Snowe, Kennedy and Schumer, Consgressman John Brademas among others, have been former recipients of this most important distinction.

His first appointment as member of the Greek Diplomatic Corps was Belgrade, Yugoslavia, where he served for two years as commercial attaché. In 1985 he was appointed Consul General of Greece in San Francisco. In 1991 he returned to the US as Deputy Permanent Representative of Greece to the United Nations. From 2002 onwards, he assumed the post of Permanent Representative and his time in that position coincided with two very important developments: Greece's European Union Presidency in the first half of 2003 and the country's tenure as a non permanent Security Council member.






